

"By God's grace and the power of the Holy Spirit, IBAC is expanding in many areas in 2022. We have opened new institutes in Mexico, Costa Rica, Bolivia, Argentina and Peru. We are especially excited to be expanding our training locations in the northern jungle of Panama with an indigenous group called Gnobe. One of our Costa Rican team members, named Michael Vargas, is spearheading this expansion with the Gnobe. Michael has been trained and equipped through IBAC over the last 5 years and now leads this endeavor. It is especially important to provide theological training to this group of Gnobe, since they are relatively close to an area of their reservation (jungle) that has still not been fully reached with the gospel. Therefore the strategy is to equip and mobilize the Gnobe church on the Caribbe an side to reach the remainder of their people. Please pray for Michael and this endeavor.

Over these last months of war in Ukraine, many who were fleeing came to us. Amidst the pain, we offered the healing hope of the Gospel. Our Psalm booklets were given to each person at our church hubswhether they had a seat on the bus or were there to say goodbye. Inside there are 22 select psalms with short intro devotionals. The gospel message is found on the closing pages. The foreword reads as follows:

"God's word offers us hope in the darkest of days. Even when our world turns upside-

down,

God promises to be with us. He remains the same, as our ever-present Rock and our Shield."

Many conversations were shared around this little booklet. One woman wrote: "Yes, God's Word gives hope on the hardest days. We came to you with tears in our eyes, but we are departing with big sincere smiles. These smiles, good sleep, good food, the compassion of people, a calm in the soul, and faith that God will lead us to victory—this is what you





have given us. You have helped people return to life. You have shown us a new day filled with new opportunities. With great thanks, the people living in room #302." -Olena

This is one of the many stories we heard as thousands of refugees came through our hubs. As a team, God enabled us to collect and deliver 575 tons of food (1.5 million meals) to hard-hit parts of Ukraine through our brave network of drivers. We evacuated 5450 refugees to western Ukraine and to places throughout the EU on 51 rented buses, and vans. Many of the 752 churches in our network across central and Eastern Europe have partnered with us to receive these refugees and provide them with safe, long-term accommodations and community.

It's difficult to know what the long-term impact of the trauma from this war will be for so many. Families came through our hubs that lost everything. But the face of the Church across Europe is changing. She is rising up and she is beautiful. She is bringing hope in the midst of devastation. Pray for the healing and hope of the Gospel to bring light, even revival, to our part of the world.



Last December, our prayer team was standing across the street from the frontline team who was talking with three women working in Berlin's redlight district. As a ministry, we always have a team of at least three people praying during street outreach. I was leading a prayer team

with two other people.

The frontline team's conversation with the women was taking a long time. This is something that we always pray for! The longer the conversation, the more willing the women are to go into deeper, often times spiritual, topics. This encounter was a big deal in general because this area of the street is where a group of women from Eastern Europe stand that are heavily controlled. On this night, however, all of the bars and casinos were closed because of the corona lockdown, so it was a

quiet night with not a lot of people around.

. An hour goes by. We are still standing in the doorway of a closed shop. It is 10 pm, 35 degrees, and raining, but our team remains diligent in prayer. After praying for the women's protection and freedom from the bondage of the streets, one of my teammates cries out. "God, I pray that all 3 of these women accept you into their hearts tonight!'

And that is exactly what happened! All three of them prayed to receive Christ.

One of the volunteers on the frontline team described it as: "you could see the joy and hope fill their eyes"

Since December, we have kept in contact with the women. One of them has shown real motivation to leave the streets and has taken significant steps forward. She even returned to her home country and attended



What a joy it has been to be serving for 2 years now as a corporate chaplain at Kunes RV and Auto. I usually head for the back door of the maintenance buildings, where it says "employees only." Those tech guys (and gals) really do tell it like it is. I am responsible for 6 stores, and I visit them weekly, hoping to encourage believers (there are a few) and

share the gospel with mostly unchurched folks. I have a quarterly devotional I distribute to the nearly 200 workers I am responsible for. What they seem to love the most are the Scripture cards I make and print for them; just a verse, with my name and contact info on the bottom. "Call me anytime" is my usual line, especially if they are super-busy with customers, or under a tight time schedule for a project. Every week, someone wants to take a walk outside and dump; or find an empty office and vent. Because this company is owned by a very passionate follower of Jesus, there are very few obstacles to overcome when I walk

In addition to equipping church leaders with biblical trainings and strategic planning on discipleship,



Oscar and Karla also intentionally develop an environment for mutual discipleship among pastors so they can deepen a close relationship and find a safe place to talk about those things one can't talk about with everyone. Pastors and church leaders are always busy people. Their congregations have high expectations of them, so they often make the local church their priority. Busyness and other priorities make it difficult for church leaders to make time for their families. Oscar & Karla often meet with church leaders on a personal level to remind that family is the first ministry for a church leader. Oscar & Karla have developed different networks so that church leaders and their wives can meet with other colleagues for the purpose of discipling each other. One pastor told Oscar

Thank you for walking with us. My wife and I really don't have a close relationship with anyone except you and Karla.'

The need to serve church leaders motivated Oscar & Karla to begin construction of a Retreat & Training Center for Pastors In Guatemala.
